Since 1981 CADEIO and the Bishops' Committee for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs have co-sponsored training and professional development institutes for ecumenical and interreligious officers and others serving the Catholic community in this increasingly important area of concern— diocesan commission members, diocesan education personnel, members of religious communities that have ecumenical/ interreligious apostolates, also seminarians.

This year's nine-day interreligious institute will survey key Church documents, events, theological and pastoral principles, and current issues in the field. Major religious traditions of the world, particularly those present in the U.S. today, will be introduced. Dialogue topics arising from the current state of interreligious conversations and practical pastoral questions will shape the agenda according to the needs of the participants. There will also be opportunities to visit Islamic, Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish and Baha'i sites. The resource

team will be led by Fr. Thomas Baima, S.T.D., and Ms. Judi Longdin, Director of Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Faculty and courses are listed on the back of this sheet.

The Institute will begin on Tuesday, July 26, 2011 and conclude midday on Thursday, August 4. It will be held at the University of Saint Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, Illinois. The fee of \$999 will include registration, room, board, materials, and other expenses.
